# "We Hurt Everyday" - Family Member of Murder Victim

In 1997 a Mary Hutson was sexually assaulted after an unknown assailant broke into her home in a quiet suburb near Kingsport, TN. Her 17-year-old son was stabbed to death when confronted by the perpetrator.

For 27 years the case went unsolved and laid dormant until it was reopened in 2023. Investigators ultimately utilized recently developed family-based DNA tests on DNA evidence preserved from 1997.

The results revealed a DNA family tree which indicated that the killer had been living not far from the crime scene for more than 25 years.

On November 20, 2024, the killer was confronted with an arrest warrant and a SWAT team. He shot himself before officers could arrest him. He survived his self-inflicted wound but remains hospitalized.

At a subsequent press conference, family member Emily Bartley thanked the investigators for solving the case, fighting off tears and emotions as she said that the 27 years was a long time ago, but "it always feels like yesterday" to the family. "We hurt everyday" she continued.

As I listened to her comments at the press conference, I was reminded how important the role law enforcement and prosecutors are to a functioning society, one that recognizes that these are pursuits that impact people's lives in ways much more than LE personnel often know.

While it is easy to become cynical in a world filled with evil doers and bureaucratic red tape, there is no greater fulfillment than the gratefulness expressed by those impacted by crime.

# Who Is ICJE and Why Do I Get This Newsletter?

The Institute for Criminal Justice Education (ICJE) is a nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting law enforcement by developing and distributing educational material related to criminal investigation, law enforcement resource management, and the effective use of technology in the criminal justice field.

This information is primarily delivered through lectures and publications to governmental and security agencies with primary law enforcement functions, as well as to select companies, students, and individuals with a demonstrated need for law enforcement information.

In 1997, Alabama mandated that most state law enforcement officers must receive at least twelve hours of continuing education annually to maintain their certification. This requirement imposed a significant financial burden on over five thousand officers in medium and small departments.

To address this need, Faulkner University and Law Enforcement Training Services, LLC (LETS), have periodically offered free training with instructors donating their time. However, this training has been geographically limited and dependent on instructor availability, highlighting the need for a broader, more accessible program.

In response, ICJE was established to provide Peace Officers Standards and Training Commission (POST) certified training throughout Alabama at little or no cost to officers or their departments, thus ensuring that law enforcement officers receive the necessary education and training without financial strain.

We send out the newsletter to those who have attended or been involved with an ICJE or LECC training program over the years. This also includes those who have attended the Worship Protection Series over the last few years, and other "friends of the Editor" around the country.

Stay updated on the latest laws, regulations, and legal precedents. Participate in continuing legal education (CLE) courses and attend relevant seminars or workshops.

#### Specialized Training:

Consider specialized training in areas of law that are frequently encountered in your jurisdiction, such as criminal law, digital forensics, or financial crimes.

#### Legal Research Skills:

Hone your legal research skills to build stronger cases and present well-founded arguments.

Last week, my wife and I volunteered with Samaritan's Purse and worked on sites in western North Carolina near Boone, NC. My wife worked on a team that was dispatched daily to locations of those victims impacted by the flooding, while I was assigned to take my chainsaw and work with a crew clearing trees at homes, some in very remote mountain locations.

If you have the opportunity to volunteer, in any of the affected areas you will see God's blessings in those you help and those you work with. The woman, who lived alone in the house shown below, is but one of many who were still dealing with overwhelming damage. She shared with us that she survived by crawling under her bed as the storm raged and prayed, and prayed, and prayed for hours as the world collapsed around her home.

Fortunately, none of the trees were a direct hit, and we were able to clear a path for her to make it out of the mountain. Each and every victim we helped cried tears of overwhelming joy as help arrived, but I can assure you that it was a blessing to be a tiny part of a still massive cleanup.

My daughter lived in Tuscaloosa when the massive tornadoes hit the state in 2011, and I thought that damage was overwhelming, but the damage we witnessed in many parts of North Carolina is so much more widespread, and it will be years and years before they recover.
